#### **Cracking Codes in Maths**

Last week students in years 7 and 8 at St Joseph's Catholic High School were treated to an insight into the world of espionage. Visiting guest speaker Dr Katie Chicot from Leeds University provided the students with a whistle stop tour through the history of code breaking, demonstrating and explaining how different codes were created and challenging students to crack increasingly difficult ciphers. Students spent the afternoon wrestling with complexities of the Caesar Shift Cipher, the Transposition Cipher, and even one called Pigpen developed by a secretive organisation in the 18th century.
